

What is a 21st Century Community Learning Center?

This program supports the creation of community learning centers that provide academic enrichment opportunities during non-school hours for children, particularly students who attend high-poverty and low-performing schools. The program helps students reach state and local standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and math; offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs, and offers literacy and other educational services to the families of participating children.

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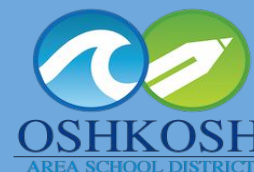
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Our Mission:

Activities vary daily. Students may work with staff or certified teachers to receive tutoring and participate in skill-building activities designed to complement their day-school learning.

Students participating in academic enrichment activities will expand on learning in ways that differ from the methods used during the school day. These activities are often interactive and project focused.

Middle Extended Learning Time is funded through a 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant from the Department of Public Instruction. The program began at Merrill Middle School in 2013 the expanded to Perry Tipler/ ALPs in 2014.
